PURPOSE

The purpose of this policy is to explain Tinternvale Primary School's commitment to making sure every member of our school community, regardless of their background or personal attributes, is treated with respect and dignity. This policy should be read alongside the following Department of Education policies:

- Equal Opportunity and Human Rights Students
- For staff, the <u>Respectful Workplaces</u> policies (including <u>Equal Opportunity Employees</u>, <u>Sexual Harassment – Employees</u> and <u>Workplace Bullying</u>) as these whole of Department policies apply to all staff at Tinternvale Primary School.

POLICY

Definitions

Personal attribute: a personal characteristic that is protected by State or Commonwealth antidiscrimination legislation. These include: race, disability, sex, sexual orientation, gender identity, religious belief or activity, political belief or activity, age, intersex status, physical features, pregnancy, carer and parental status, breastfeeding, marital or relationship status, lawful sexual activity, employment activity, industrial activity, expunged homosexual conviction or personal association with anyone who is identified with reference to any protected attribute.

Direct discrimination: unfavourable treatment because of a person's protected attribute.

Indirect discrimination: imposing an unreasonable requirement, condition or practice that disadvantages a person or group of people with a protected attribute.

Sexual harassment: unwelcome conduct of a sexual nature towards another person which could reasonably be expected to make that other person feel offended, humiliated or intimidated. It may be physical, verbal, visual or written.

Disability harassment: an action taken in relation to the person's disability that is reasonably likely, in all the circumstances, to humiliate, offend, intimidate or distress the person.

Vilification: conduct that incites hatred towards or revulsion or severe ridicule of a person or group of people on the basis of their race or religion.

Victimisation: subjecting a person or threatening to subject them to detrimental treatment because they (or their associate) has made an allegation of discrimination or harassment on the basis of a protected attribute (or asserted their rights under relevant policies or law).

Inclusion and diversity

Tinternvale Primary School strives to provide a safe, inclusive and supportive school environment which values the human rights of all students and staff.

We strive to foster a stimulating learning environment that is safe and supportive for all students. We believe that all students should be encouraged to develop their individual personalities, interests and abilities so they:

- Attain positive self-esteem and self-confidence
- Become self-motivated and independent life-long learners
- Take responsibility for themselves and their education
- Can develop leadership skills and experience
- Are willing to take risks and to learn from their mistakes and their successes
- Can work co-operatively with their peers and other members of the school community
- Develop healthy relationships with all people in the community
- Are tolerant, respectful and appreciative of people and their differences.

Tinternvale Primary School is committed to creating a school community where all members of our school community are welcomed, accepted and treated equitably and with respect regardless of their backgrounds or personal attributes such as race, language, religious beliefs, gender identity, disability or sexual orientation so that they can participate, achieve and thrive at school.

Tinternvale Primary School acknowledges and celebrates the diversity of backgrounds and experiences in our school community and we will not tolerate behaviours, language or practices that label, stereotype or demean others. At Tinternvale Primary School we value the human rights of every student and we take our obligations under anti-discrimination laws and the Charter of Human Rights and Responsibilities seriously.

Tinternvale Primary School will:

- Actively nurture and promote a culture where everyone is treated with respect and dignity
- ensure that students are not discriminated against (directly or indirectly) and where
 necessary, are reasonably accommodated to participate in their education and school
 activities (eg schools sports, productions etc) on the same basis as their peers
- acknowledge and respond to the diverse needs, identities and strengths of all students
- encourage empathy and fairness towards others
- challenge stereotypes that promote prejudicial and biased behaviours and practices
- contribute to positive learning, engagement and wellbeing outcomes for students
- respond to complaints and allegations appropriately and ensure that students are not victimised.

At Tinternvale Primary School, we believe that individual and community wellbeing are the foundation for positive relationships and effective learning. We strive to embed a culture of kindness, inclusion and honesty amongst our students, families, staff and within the wider community.

- We promote student voice, agency and leadership in and out of our classrooms and provide many opportunities for students to develop and apply these fundamental skills to enact positive change in our school.
- Students at Tinternvale Primary School participate in structured Wellbeing lessons each week following the URstrong Friendology framework and the Respectful Relationships curriculum.

Bullying, unlawful discrimination, harassment, vilification and other forms of inappropriate behaviour targeting individuals or groups because of their personal attributes will not be tolerated at Tinternvale Primary School. We will take appropriate measures, consistent with our *Student Wellbeing and Engagement* and *Bullying* policies to respond to students who demonstrate these behaviours at our school.

Students who may have experienced or witnessed this type of behaviour are encouraged to speak up and to let their teachers, parents or carers know about those behaviours to ensure that inappropriate behaviour can be addressed.

Reasonable adjustments for students with disabilities

Tinternvale Primary School also understands that it has a legal obligation to make reasonable adjustments to accommodate students with disabilities. A reasonable adjustment is a measure or action taken to assist students with disabilities to participate in their education on the same basis as their peers. Reasonable adjustments will be made for students with disabilities in consultation with the student, their parents or carers, their teachers and if appropriate, their treating practitioners. Our school may consult through Student Support Group processes and in other less formal ways.
